	<p>Starr Hardidge</p>	<p>Called Chief Wilma Man-killer: She was known as the first woman chief of the Cherokee nation. She particularly sought after healthcare issues and the education system.</p>
	<p>Mike Wimmer</p>	<p>Fort Smith Council, 1865</p> <p>The main meeting dealt with Indian affairs east of the rocky mountains. It essentially reestablished tribal status.</p>
	<p>Mitsuno Ishii Reedy</p>	<p>a key figure that lead in the civil rights movement. Through OU she challenged Oklahoma's segregation laws.</p>
	<p>Charles Banks Wilson</p>	<p>Woody Guthrie was a folk singer songwriter. He focused on politics, socialism, anti-fascism, and dust bowl ballads.</p>
	<p>Ross Myers</p>	<p>White tailed Deer in Choctaw county: Choctaw county is primarily rural and was in Choctaw tribal land before colonial influence. Railroads established the</p>

		towns inside and was bought from France in the Louisiana purchase.
